Objectives stated in the original proposal were met. Both students and their families had access to and received services from the Dragon Market. Specifically, students received food, hygiene products, baby supplies, and household necessities weekly, and more often in cases of emergency. Students also received access to mental and medical health care at no cost to them through funding received from the Najim Charitable Foundation and partnership with University Health System.

Students reported feeling better able to focus on their education and better attendance as a result of access to these services. Importantly, they also felt less familial pressure to miss school in order to take on extra shifts at work. Students had fewer absences due to illness and reported reduced levels of anxiety.

3: Please explain any changes from the original proposal and the circumstances that lead to the modification of the objective.

No changes were made.

4: What needs were addressed?

Access to mental health care, access to medical care, food insecurity, social-emotional learning, access to basic necessities, life skills, and coping skills.

5: What method of evaluation did you use to monitor and measure the project's outcome and what are the result?

Students' attendance and retention were monitored. Students were also surveyed for pre and post program experience. Key performance indicators were used to identify the nature and scope of student need.

6: Do you plan to continue this project, and if so, how do you plan to sustain it?

Texans Can Academies - San Antonio and Texans Can Academies - Highlands plan both to continue and to expand the project, as the Whole Student Program is crucial to the success of Texans Can students. Funds from the annual luncheon will be committed to the program. The Development team is also working on VOCA and similar grants to fund the program for multiple years.

7: Please provide any other comments of information relevant to this grant.

Operating the Whole Student Program with the addition of the Student Assistance Team has helped Texans Can leadership at multiple levels understand the need for co-location of services when it comes to all social and mental health care needs. Based on the capacity of the school staff and the resources available, the new goal is to offer as many if not all services related to the Whole Student on campus. Transporting students to counseling appointments has proved difficult for school staff and the student's families. On-campus counseling could expedite the delivery of these crucial services and lead to more desirable outcomes.
