Program / Project Description:

The CAMPership Project addresses the needs of families wishing to send their children with special needs to Camp CAMP, but do not have the financial means to pay the full cost. The project helps fill the shortfall between the amount parents can afford to pay and the actual cost (\$1,700).

For 40 years, CAMP has embodied the founding principle that any person with a disability, especially a child, should be afforded the same opportunities to participate in socal and recreational activities as an individual without a disability. CAMP serves individuals with mild to severe disabilities, with diagnoses such as: Autism Spectrum Disorder, Intellectual Disability, Down syndrome, Cerebral Palsy, Traumatic Brain Injury, Spina Bifida, visual impairment, and hearing impairment. Many campers who attend CAMP do not have the option of going to other camps, including "special needs camps," due to the severity of their disability or medical condition.

While living with a disability or medical condition encompasses obvious challenges for the individual, the challenges do not end there - they extend to the entire family. According to the U.S. Census Bureau's, 2012-2016 American Community Survey five year estimates show that, in Bexar County alone, 24,794 children ages 5 to 17 live at home (not institutionalized) with an ambulatory, cognitive, hearing, or vision disability. Caregivers often experience frustration, stress, depression, isolation, high divorce rates, mental and physical health issues, guilt, blame, and reduced self-esteem. Additionally, there are limited options individuals who have significant needs or who are considered medically fragile to share "typical" experiences such as summer camp with their siblings. Due to a lack of organizations who are equipped and designed to serve this population in South Texas, there is a significant gap in organizations that support the entire family with social, respite, and recreational opportunities. These experiences are critical for the individual, but are equally important for the health and balance of the entire family.

CAMP addresses these challenges by offering a summer camping program consisting of nine distinct one-week residential sessions at our 55-acre, 300-bed capacity camp in Center Point, Texas. Individuals with special needs, and their non-disabled siblings, participate in traditional camping acitivites such as swimming, horseback riding, canoeing, archery, outdoor cooking, paintball, music recreation, nature discovery, arts & crafts, and a CAMP dance. CAMP alleviates the medical, physical, developmental, social, and intellectual barriers for campers by adapting all of its recreational and social activities to allow full participation. While their child is at CAMP, parents receive much needed respite from the rigors of their 24/7 caregiving responsibilities. They have an opportunity to relax, catch their breath, reconnect, and experience things they typically do not have time to enjoy. In many cases, this is the only break they receive all year.

During the summer of 2018, 719 of the 835 campers (86%) who attended Camp CAMP requested financial assistance. Furthermore, of the 429 campers from Bexar County who attended, only 47 (12.47%) could afford the full cost, and CAMP provided \$357,214 in total CAMPerships.

Evaluation Plan:

Annually, programs are evaluated and improved to ensure our capacity to meet the needs of the community. At the end of each program, families are asked to provide an evaluation to share CAMP's impact and how beneficial the financial support was to their family. In 2018, of the parents who responded, 91.2% of the parents who received financial support agreed, or strongly agreed, that the CAMPership Project was beneficial to their family.

Plans to sustain project beyond the term of this request:

CAMP is committed to ensuring the success of the CAMPership Project to provide on-going support for those in need. Financial support for the 2019 CAMPership Project will come from individuals, foundations, and corporations. Annually, CAMP develops a diverse financial development plan focused on board giving, designated appeals, foundation support, special events, program service fees, and contributions from individuals and corporations. We will continue to solicit gifts from other philanthropic members of our community who support individuals with special needs to fulfill the budget requirements for this program.
