## **Program / Project Description:**

This grant will address the critical need for Volunteer Advocates due to the epidemic of child abuse in Bexar County. According to the Department of Family and Protective Services, Bexar County had the highest number of removals (1,702) and children in custody (5,341) in Texas for 2019. This problem overwhelms the system and CPS lacks the capacity to identify and procure holistic and timely health, legal and educational interventions. The average child spends 13 months in foster care, although the length varies from 1 month to 9 years. The average child changes placements twice; however, those dealing with complex medical or special needs move an average of 6 times. In the process, records are lost, and care is inconsistent. Abuse is associated with a range of risks--juvenile delinquency, suicide, unemployment, and poor school performance. According to the Family Care Network (2019), over 60% of child trafficking victims were in foster care, and 33% of homeless adults were previously in foster care.

CASA serves children and youth (ages 0-21) in Bexar County who are in legal custody of Child Protective Services (CPS) who have been removed from their homes due to abuse and neglect. CASA Volunteer Advocates are recruited from the community, train for 33 hours, and are sworn in by the Bexar County Court so that they may speak on behalf of the best interest of children on court-appointed welfare cases.

They spend an average of 180 hours per case, obtaining critical information from contact with doctors, teachers and other professionals who are aware of the children's needs. Typically, judges select the most complex cases for CASA to serve on, since our volunteers often provide critical information that helps the judge determine the best final placement for the children on the case. By researching the best options for the children, a CASA Volunteer Advocate can provide more information to the Judge than anyone else involved in the case. The agency is led by CEO Marina Gonzales, who reports to the Board of Directors and currently employs 44 full-time employees, including 24 Advocate Supervisors who oversee the Volunteer Advocates. CASA operates under a cost-effective model, in which one CASA staff member can supervise up to 27 Volunteer Advocates. In FY 2019, 664 active Volunteer Advocates successfully served 1,810 CASA children. In terms of economic impact, last year alone, CASA Volunteer Advocates provided services to the Bexar County Courts worth an estimated \$1,106,254.

This request would help us reach our FY 2021 (7/1/2020 - 6/30/2021) goal to recruit, train and support a capable volunteer base of up to 792 Volunteer Advocates to serve 1980 children. Major program components include recruitment, training, supervision, support, and retention of volunteers. Volunteer Advocates train for 33 hours in medical, mental health, cultural competency, communications, and trauma so that they may "speak" on behalf of the best interest of the child in court. They then spend an average of 15-20 hours per month, obtaining critical information from contact with doctors, teachers and other professionals who are aware of the child's needs. By researching the best options for the child, a CASA volunteer can provide more information to the judge than anyone else involved in the case. We estimate this year's project cost for three Advocate Supervisors to be \$139,000 based on an increase in fringe and salaries due to merit raises. Last year, we served 1810 children in state protective custody through 664 active volunteers. Our strategic plan sets a realistic growth rate based on modified program capacity with an average 6% annual increase and 2.5 children served per volunteer. This program has been in existence for 36 years and is a sound investment in the future of Bexar County's most vulnerable children. In the past year, volunteer retention has been at a record high of 95%, much higher than the national average of 65%. This high retention rate leads to better outcomes as experienced volunteers can knowledgeably address complex situations and, potentially, take on more than one case at a time. Staff turnover in the past year was 1.84%. This figure was achieved with zero employee turnover for 8 months of the year. CASA is the only agency in Bexar County legally authorized by the Texas Family Code to provide court appointed advocacy services for children and youth who have been removed from their homes and are in the legal custody of Child Protective Services. Judges have requested a CASA volunteer for every child who needs one; at our current capacity CASA can only serve about 67% of children eligible to receive CASA services. Our goal is to provide an Advocate for every child referred through the Bexar County Children's Court.

#### **Evaluation Plan:**

CASA plans to serve 1980 children through the work of 792 volunteer Advocates during our FY20 (July 1, 2020 - June 30, 2021).

CASA will use statistical data collection through the Optima system to track and monitor the following: 1. 90% of the time, a CASA Advocate will serve a child as a constant, stable presence through the duration of a case.

2. 100% of the time, Advocates will have a specific and measurable impact on legal, medical and educational outcomes.

3. 95% of the time, Judges will agree and implement suggestions for the child's welfare and placement as recommended by a CASA Advocate.

#### Plans to sustain project beyond the term of this request:

Our vision is to improve the lives of abused and neglected children in State protective custody in Bexar County by providing a volunteer Advocate to every child in the foster care system who needs one. CASA maintains a long-term strategic plan to achieve our key objectives and sustainability. This includes the continued execution of our funding model for sustainable operations funding, the execution of strategic partnerships as well as the creation of financial efficiencies via administrative services. We will continue to be the voice for abused and neglected children and maintain diligence in obtaining other revenue sources, including State, foundation, corporate and individual contributions.
