Program / Project Description:

CRRC's Crisis Programs address a myriad of needs for families in our community and funding is used primarily by securing food and household supplies for client families through our partnership with the San Antonio Food Bank. The average cost of food is 15 cents per pound purchased. CRRC is also able to receive a number of items that are deemed "quick date" such as bread, produce, and dairy at no cost at all; therefore, our buying power really goes a long ways. CRRC serves over 10,000 individuals with food annually, which includes over 3,500 families with children. 30% of those served are children under the age of 18. Special emphasis is made to provide diapers, formula, and baby food for parents in need.

CRRC also provides a children's summer feeding program that provides kid-friendly foods for families to help offset costs during the summer months. Just one of the four elementary schools in our service area alone has a 63% rate of students who qualify for free/reduced meals. In the summer, these families are not afforded the free breakfasts and lunches their children receive during the school year. Secondary to providing food, CRRC assists with financial needs such as utility assistance (water, electric, and propane), emergency prescription drug assistance, and rental assistance at an average of \$150 to \$200 per residential address. A majority of our client families are living in sub-standard housing with inadequate insulation at a high rental rate due to housing availability and demand. These inefficiencies cause higher than average utility rates for heating and cooling. Often times, CRRC will have to partner with other service agencies in our area to meet the financial needs to keep a family in their home or a utility service turned on. These are basic needs that a family has to have to maintain a stable environment for their children. CRRC does not pay deposits or re-connection fees.

CRRC maintains a Durable Medical Equipment (DME) loan program to include wheelchairs, potty chairs, shower benches, canes, crutches, and walkers. We also carry an adequate supply of adult and infant diapers as well as bed pads we provide for free to those in need. In the event of uninsured or under-insured, these expenses can tax a families finances and make it unstable. CRRC also continues to provide the delivery of Meals-on-Wheels to an average of 54 home-bound residents per week. Each resident on the route receives 5 nutritional meals per week in addition to wellness checks from our drivers.

Evaluation Plan:

CRRC maintains an extensive database for all of our client families that allows us to track their usage of services effectively. In some cases, client families only need us for a short time while they get back on their feet, and in others, they are living off of disability and will need constant assistance to help make ends meet. Either way, we can track usage needs and adjust plans as needed to keep families fed and in their homes with adequate basic utilities.

Plans to sustain project beyond the term of this request:

CRRC serves a very giving community. Not only are we sustained by annual grants, but also through fundraising, individual donations, and monthly local church participation to help us sustain our budget. In addition, we are sustained by our Thrift Store, which currently provides over 50% of our income. While our plans are to work to reduce the need for our services, with Comal County being the 2nd fastest growing county in the nation, we believe this will be on ongoing need as some are weened off the program, there will be others moving in to take their place.
