Harvey E. Najim Family Foundation Priorities:

Program / Project Description:

As Comal County begins to find its new normal after Coronavirus crisis, CRRC knows it will be addressing a larger variety of needs than in the past. You can help us reach generations of youth in Canyon Lake!

CRRC plans to continue to address food, shelter and clothing needs to children. But our dream is to provide medical, dental, optometry and mental health services to secure better overall health for children and their families. We will have prescription assistance, and offices for families to access government benefits like WIC and SNAP.

CRRC is asking for an investment in the future of Canyon Lake families. That investment will save our organization money in the future but allow us to help more families in more ways than ever before. Families will be able to access a number of assistance entities/agencies all in one place. More and more, Community Based Organizations (CBOs) like CRRC are seeking to address the whole person or the whole family. CRRC has been working on a cooperative effort with other agencies for four years. The "one-stop shop" will save clients time and money, while also allowing agencies to collaborate on the assistance being provided.

The time has come for us to make use of our 4,000 square feet upstairs. To further our agency cooperative, office spaces are needed. Walls and doors and windows and conference and class rooms need to be constructed. For mental health services we need counseling space that is comfortable and welcoming, as well as rooms for peer group sessions. For dental health services we need a treatment room with water and power access. For medical services we will need exam rooms and private office space for practitioners. For government benefits representatives, we'll need offices with furnishings to accommodate them and their clients.

Because of COVID-19, CRRC immediately expanded our food services to children. School was closed and our clients' children were at home, eating three meals a day instead of just one. Parents needed the support because so many were short of income due to loss of hours or jobs.

We understand the new needs. It will place some immediate demands on our finances. But client finances will be tighter than ever for simple medical treatment. The funds were never there for mental health counseling. Dental health is rarely thought about until the child complains; when it is too late. Eye exams and eyeglasses are typical luxuries for our families. These will continue to set families back unless we can step in. By providing these services, and more, we will save families money, keep them healthier, and more stable. We hope you will want to invest in our families' futures as well as the future families in need by helping us to create a Resource Center that addresses every day needs.

Evaluation Plan:

CRRC maintains an extensive, adaptable database for all of the adults and children that access CRRC resources. This allows us to effectively track usage of services. The framework allows for expansion/addition to include more information so we will be able to tell how many children have been referred to our partners. All referrals and encounters will be logged in our database.

NOTE: Children will not be served new services during the project timeline. They will begin receiving additional service following project completion.

In all cases, we can track each child's needs, referrals made and how they utilize the new services. Our MOUs will help us to coordinate and record services, creating a unique, cooperative treatment plan for each household.

Plans to sustain project beyond the term of this request:

The expanded 4,000 sq. ft. of our building will be made available for other agencies/services at a rental price. This will be based on average local rates for office space, and adjusted for non-profits. While the monthly rent per agency will be low for their monthly or weekly clinics, having several rentals per week will help to cover utility and maintenance expenses.

CRRC pursues grants, but we also have a generous and loyal community. So, through fundraising, individual donations, and monthly local church participation we are able to meet our needs. Our Thrift Store, made possible by our community as well, currently provides over 50% of our income. For two years Comal County has been the second fastest growing county in the nation. We believe growth will continue, as well as sales and support. This project will be needed to serve many more (than just 3,000)
