Program / Project Description:

Funding requested from the Najim Family Foundation for the 2020-2021 cycle will be utilized to support the continued expansion of our educational programming to reach more children with our messages of compassion, respect, and responsibility. All of our programs offer strategies to build self-esteem and leadership skills using teaching topics involving animals and the environment, while also working on developing a passion for volunteering, service, and stewardship.

This year, due to the COVID-19 pandemic, our Humane Education team has had to quickly pivot and re-design the entirety of our programming to reach our students remotely. For example, Camp Humane looked quite a bit different this summer. Instead of meeting in person, we revamped our typical camp sessions into virtual events via our "Connected Classroom." Each week, students picked up their supplies curbside from our Outreach team and completed engaging animal-themed assignments every day with the virtual guidance of our educators. While we couldn't meet in person, our animal-loving campers still learned about topics ranging from responsible pet care to the process of becoming a veterinarian.

As we head into a new school year, our educators are also working closely with school officials to continue our "Tales for Tails" reading program. It is our goal to have kids reading to our shelter pets via Zoom to continue encouraging students to practice their reading skills in order to improve fluency, comprehension, and confidence. This gives students needing additional assistance in meeting their reading level requirements a chance to read out loud in a comfortable, judgment-free zone, and also gives the animals valuable (virtual!) socialization time.

We are requesting funding from the Najim Family Foundation to help us continue to create more engaging, dual-purpose curriculum that can be easily converted between virtual and in-person learning. For example, iPads can be used for individual students to read to a shelter pet with our "Tales for Tails" reading program, or they can be used for research and content creation once we are able to meet in person. Likewise, Go-Pro equipment can enable our educators to create more engaging and on-the-go content, or they can be used by students to create adoption videos at an in-person Camp Humane session.

There has never been a more important time in our children's lives to provide opportunities to foster compassion, respect, and responsibility. Through all of our Humane Education programs, virtual or in-person, every activity, game, and experience is centered on the importance of discovering how to stretch critical thinking skills to the limit while also developing a strong sense of empathy. Students are challenged to come up with solutions to thought-provoking situations; compassion by being exposed to shelter pets and hearing the stories of how they came to be at the shelter; and presentation skills when participating in projects such as adoption videos. All of these skills are transferable not only to other areas of academia, but in everyday life as students grow into compassionate, ethical adults. We believe that these skills are more valuable now more than ever, and are determined to continue offering Humane Education to our city's kids remotely until we can see them again in person.

Evaluation Plan:

Our educators keep track of each program provided, as well as the number of children at each presentation. As our year progresses, we are able to evaluate our progress in real time as numbers are tracked. At the end of the year, we will be able to measure the growth in both new programming as well as the total amount of children educated.

Overall success will be determined by the number of programs offered as well as the total amount of children educated.

Plans to sustain project beyond the term of this request:

In addition to support from the Najim Family Foundation, we will seek funding from other foundations and grantors, as well as from individual donations, including pledges, unrestricted contributions, direct mail responses, tributes and memorials, and 3rd party events.
