Elementary to High School

Program / Project Description:

Through our three flagship programs, Laying the Foundation teacher training program, the College Readiness Program, and UTeach, NMSI provides a comprehensive set of supports for students from elementary school through higher education. Fully implemented, the three programs work together to ensure students have the necessary knowledge and skills to thrive in STEM and builds a pipeline of students equipped to reach their highest potential as STEM-literate problem-solvers and lifelong learners. NMSI is implementing our programs in the San Antonio metro area to build on our existing work with five local districts. We plan to utilize funds requested from the Najim Family Foundation to support the Laying the Foundation teacher training as part of our larger effort in the San Antonio community.

All math, science, and English teachers from elementary, middle, and high school within selected feeder patterns will have access to NMSI's Laying the Foundation training. LTF training is hands-on and provides teachers with classroom-ready resources and instructional best practices necessary for supporting diverse groups of students and helping them build the knowledge, skills, and dispositions necessary for success in school and in the workforce. Laying the Foundation reinforces vertical team effectiveness and creates a student pathway to advanced math, science, and English instruction beginning with elementary grades. The addition of specific Vertical Team training in all NMSI-supported subject areas, as well as school-based Professional Learning Communities, will reinforce the effectiveness of LTF training across grade levels and provide teachers with touchpoints throughout the year to collaborate and refine their practice. NMSI utilizes a blended professional development model which leverages technology to provide teachers with instruction in online and in-person formats. This allows teachers choice in their professional development experience and provides live and on-demand options. This approach is also necessary as we consider the current need for flexibility. At this time, we plan to deliver all training online.

Results from studies of LTF indicate that students of LTF-trained teachers outperformed students with comparable academic achievement of teachers not receiving the LTF training across grade level and subject area. Evaluation of prior implementations demonstrated that districts participating in LTF training are outpacing statewide performance on standardized assessment tests. We expect to see similar results for students in San Antonio, along with teachers reporting increased content knowledge and use of effective instructional strategies, teachers will implement the strategies and techniques learned in NMSI trainings in their classrooms.

Evaluation Plan:

NMSI is committed to continual, rigorous program evaluation. We utilize an internal process of participant evaluation (surveys from both students and teachers) following every event and/or implementation year. NMSI routinely analyzes quantitative and qualitative data gathered from ongoing program activities to make adjustments and engages in systematic iteration of our programs based on in-depth analysis of data from our partners to ensure ongoing relevance and success.

NMSI employs a robust and efficient management structure that facilitates data sharing and analysis with our partners. A dedicated Program Manager will work with the district to ensure successful program implementation, and acting as a dialogical coach to help foster a district-wide culture of success and engage at the district and school levels to set ambitious but realistic goals, and ensure successful implementation of the program.

Plans to sustain project beyond the term of this request:

NMSI has worked alongside San Antonio districts and partners since 2017 and we will plan to work closely with administrators, as always, to ensure that the changes implemented are sustainable for our school partners. Given the shifting educational landscape, it will be critical to ensure that leaders are well-equipped with the tools necessary to serve the varying needs of their students and teachers. NMSI's coaching and resources are designed to allow leaders to take ownership over the shifts taking place in their schools and will provide a strong foundation for lasting change.
