Program / Project Description:

Full or Partial funding will support out of school programming for youth residents living in affordable housing across Bexar, Comal, and Guadalupe counties. Center for Disease Control and Prevention recognizes Social Determinant of Health (SDOH) (where you live, grow up, play, work, etc.) factors affect an individual's healthy outcomes and longevity. Prospera purposely addresses these needs by providing programs/services for adults and youth that are focused on the five SDOH factors (safe neighborhood, health/health care, social/community, education, and economic stability).

For our youth residents, Prospera's out-of-school programming focuses on providing a safe neighborhood environment with young adult mentors with a goal emphasis on education completion for long-term economic stability into adulthood. Our programs include after-school programming, Explore College Day, Summer programming and Back-to-School Bash. The after-school program with scholastic tutoring, computer literacy, reading comprehension assistance, arts/crafts, nutrition, and health/wellness. After-school program runs from 3:00-5:00 p.m. every Monday-Thursday. The annual Spring Explore College Day exposes Prospera youth to the possibilities of a higher-education degree, how to apply for funding (grants, scholarships, etc.) and meet/greet opportunities with college representatives to ask questions about college life, classes, etc. The annual Prospera summer programming provides onsite programs and overnight field trips to teach youth residents about self-identity, self-efficacy, independence, and peer-relationship building while being away from home and in a rural setting for a few days. Our Back-to-School Bash helps to get our youth residents ready for a new school year of learning. This event held in August highlights the importance of continuing one's education by attending school and after school program. This event reminds parents and youth that as a community, Prospera believes in helping our youth residents grow into successful adults.

Prospera is unique in providing programs/services focused on SDOH. Our long-term goal is to improve the economic stability and long-term outcomes of the younger residents living in affordable housing by providing them with the tools and resources to help them succeed in their education. By helping our younger generation, we are making stronger and more resilient residents for the community. Currently, we have 237 youth residents in 15 total properties across Bexar, Comal, and Guadalupe counties participating in our out-of-school programming throughout the year. Across all Prospera properties (49 properties), we have 765 youth residents participating in out-of-school programming. Demographics on ages and ethnicity are provided within the application. Our expected results from the out-of-school program include improved grades for youth residents, increased participation in programs/services, increased willingness to apply for higher-education opportunities, and increased awareness regarding personal health/wellness and nutrition.

Evaluation Plan:

Prospera records/tracks youth residents' participation in services/programs through the Apricot Social Solutions software. We collect and disseminate data to our partners to highlight the direct impact of their investment into Prospera and the residents we serve.

We will track both qualitative and quantitative metrics to evaluate the efficiency of our out-of-school programming:

o Track report cards/progress reports provided by youth's family and measure number of youths participating in homework assistance/tutoring and if their grade increased as a result.

o Track number of youth residents attending Explore College Day event and measure their perceptions of college (pre/post event) and intent to complete and receive high-school diploma and continue onto higher-education opportunities.

o Track number of youth residents participating in health/wellness and nutrition services/programs o Track number of youth participating in summer programming/ field trips and measure their perceptions of self-identity, self-efficacy, and independence (pre/post event).

o Track number of youths receiving supplies/backpack for upcoming school year.

Plans to sustain project beyond the term of this request:

Beyond the grant period, Prospera will continue to seek funding to support programming costs for out-of-school programming/services through local, regional and national foundations, our annual fundraiser luncheon, and charitable bingo revenue. As always, Prospera will continue to work closely with local non-profit agencies to provide program/services to residents and community members free of charge.
