Program / Project Description:

SAReads addresses two critical needs facing low-income children: the need for effective reading instruction and books. The pandemic has forced many schools to switch to remote learning, and disconnected students are missing all of school. These children have no recourse if their teachers do not have the knowledge and skills to teach them to read when they return to school. As cognitive scientist Dr. Mark Seidenberg states, "Whereas talking with children guarantees that they will learn to speak, reading to children does not guarantee that they will learn to read." (Language At The Speed of Sight: How We Read, Why So Many Can't, And What Can Be Done About It, 2017)

Generous support from The Najim Charitable Foundation has empowered SAReads(R) to become an elite agency focused on the need to improve children's reading outcomes through effective reading instruction. SAReads(R) ranked among the top 5 Texas Reading Academies in 2020, and the only Texas nonprofit focused solely on improving access to the science of teaching reading for low income children. SAReads(R) is respected among reading researchers across the country for our commitment to serving low income children by improving access to effective reading instruction. This year SAReads(R) will grow by 76% to impact more than 4400 children. Regardless of ethnicity, income or learning differences, more than 95% of children can learn to read on grade level with proper instruction. The most fundamental responsibility of schools is teaching students to read.

SAReads(R) is celebrating ten years as a nonprofit organization in 2020. We are stronger than ever in our mission to improve children's literacy and educational attainment. We will impact thousands of children over the next decade by improving reading instruction in their schools. We will share the lessons we have learned about the science of teaching reading to empower our community to advocate for change for all kids. For decades, public schools have taught reading using the very strategies that cause children to struggle with reading. The vast majority of teachers use a theory about reading that cognitive scientists have repeatedly debunked. False assumptions about what is required to be a skilled reader have created deep inequalities among U.S. children, putting many on a difficult path in life. And notably, most teachers and parents do not know there is anything wrong with these existing theories and reading instruction approaches.

Funds requested will allow SAReads(R) to address the underlying issue of education inequity by training, coaching and supporting teachers to change the way they teach children to read to benefit all children. We know reading failure can be prevented. It is possible to teach most children how to read if we start early and follow the significant body of research showing which practices are most effective. Children living in poverty, children of color, and children with learning differences can become competent readers. Persistent "gaps" between more advantaged and less advantaged children can be narrowed and even closed. These gaps are the result of differences in children's opportunities to learn--not their learning abilities. SAReads(R) is partnering with education leaders to bring the science of teaching reading to dozens of schools and thousands of children.

In addition, SAReads(R) will resume book bank operations to increase children's access to books when Covid-19 restrictions are lifted. In partnership with bookstores and community organizations, SAReads(R) collects and distributes thousands of children's books per year to children, high-need schools and nonprofits serving low-income children because access to books is a persistent need for children.

Evaluation Plan:

The Science of Reading is a vast body of research based on hundreds of studies conducted by dozens of researchers over decades, and involving fields in the social and hard sciences. A sufficient number of studies have produced similar results to allow researchers to conclude that certain things are true and others are not. SAReads(R) will evaluate how teachers implement the science of teaching reading and the impact on student reading outcomes. The Texas Education Agency is not administering the STAAR test due to Covid-19, therefore SAReads(R) will evaluate the project using student reading data obtained from teachers. Our 2020-21 objectives are to expand the project to impact more children and lay the foundation for years of improved student reading outcomes in our schools.

Plans to sustain project beyond the term of this request:

SAReads(R) is a multiyear project to increase the number of children reading on grade level by improving classroom reading instruction and access to books. The project is supported by the City of San Antonio, diverse foundations and contributions from participating schools. We are focused on achieving results for children by adhering to science. This approach has enabled SAReads(R) to become a reputable and successful project even during the devastating coronavirus pandemic. We are expanding to serve more children and increase awareness about the need to prevent children's reading failure through evidence-based reading instruction. Financial support from corporate and private foundations, including The Najim Charitable Foundation, is essential to helping SAReads(R) meet the enormous challenge of preventing children's reading failure and its rapidly cascading effects on learning other subjects.
