## Harvey E. Najim Family Foundation Priorities:

Disabilities/Special Needs

### **Program / Project Description:**

The goal of Texas Lions Camp, Inc. (TLC) is to provide a residential summer camp experience and promote an atmosphere where campers will learn the 'Can Do' philosophy as well as position them "to step into their calling" and achieve maximum personal growth and self-esteem. The TLC medical and program teams work together to provide opportunities for growth in confidence and self-help skills. Without knowing it, campers learn about dealing with respective conditions in a fun/safe environment, share with others who have the same condition and learn team-building activities with peers that promotes group engagement.

At camp, learning takes on many forms. For many campers, meeting other children or staff members who have similar health conditions provides a sense of security and confidence (that is achieved through knowledge that they are not alone) while promoting the peer education process. The education program is designed and implemented by TLC's medical team of physicians, nurses, dietitians and students who join camp staff during summer sessions. Campers are monitored throughout camp sessions as they participate in a therapeutic recreational program. The recreation program allows campers to participate in summer activities which challenge campers to overcome fear or failure and encourages the message that they 'Can Do' whatever challenge lies before them. Core services include: Swimming, Workshops, Music, Pedal boating, Horsemanship, Archery, Arts/Crafts, Nature studies, Ceramics, Team sports, Theater, Fishing, Barnyard, Ropes course, Green-thumb, CSI (Camp Scene Investigation) and Diabetic Education.

Learning the "Can Do" philosophy and allowing children with special medical conditions to achieve maximum personal growth and self-esteem through a residential summer camp experience were the key objectives of Texas Lions Camp during Summer Camp 2019 and our virtual Summer Camp 2020. The recreation and program activities were designed/implemented by TLC's program and medical team (who joined camp staff during summer sessions). Core services included 20 different activities for the children.

During Summer, 2019, TLC served 1,512 children from 130 or 51% of 254 counties in Texas. A total of 159 children or 11% were from Bexar, Atascosa, Bandera, Comal, Guadalupe, Kendall, Kerr, Medina and Wilson counties. Further, 80 children were from Bexar County which was 50.3% of the total children served from the Greater San Antonio area and a total of \$148,000 (based on cost of \$1,850 per child) was invested in Bexar County alone. The 80 children from Bexar County collectively attended eight of the nine summer sessions (from June 2 - August 3, 2019). Top five major diagnoses of these campers participating in Summer 2019 included: Type 1 Diabetes, Physical Disabilities, Hearing Impaired, Asthma and Down Syndrome.

As TLC evaluated the evolution and impact of the Coronavirus, the Board of Directors, staff and Lions of Texas watched and realized that the systems that this camp was dependent upon to keep children safe were not in place for the Summer of 2020. This dealt with our capacity to safely transport staff to the campus from overseas, to transporting children who had multiple health concerns from across the state of Texas and being able to co-habit in one place. In addition, TLC did not want to become a drain on local healthcare resources ourselves should Covid-19 infections result here on our Kerrville campus.

Of greatest concern was the fact that virtually all of TLC's campers were listed by the CDC as having increased risk from contracting a Covid-19 infection. Clearly, the health and safety of our kiddos, their families, our Lions, volunteers and staff were not something TLC was prepared to place at risk and certainly not at greater risk. What this meant for the Summer of 2020 was that TLC transitioned operations to include summer activities but did not open our residential operations onsite for check-in of campers. The TLC camp leadership and team developed new and exciting offerings for the summer that were offered online, mailed home and other interactive programs during the interim. Summer Programs 2020 opened on July 5th under the new flagship program: TLC2U! Children who were registered for Camp received a care-package in the mail from TLC. Each box was filled with camp-swag, goodies and all kinds of activities and items that were needed for the program. Then on July 5th, TLC made history together when campers, their families, Lions and staff from all over the world joined ONLINE in the fun as one, larger community. TLC is evaluating the incorporation of TLC2U as part of our future program offerings for children who are unable to attend TLC in person.

During Summer, 2020, TLC served 1,034 children from 129 or 51% of 254 counties in Texas. A total of 141 children or 14% were from Bexar, Atascosa, Bandera, Comal, Guadalupe, Kendall, Kerr, Medina and Wilson counties. Further, 80 children were from Bexar County which was 57% of total children served. Top four major diagnoses of these campers included: Type 1 Diabetes, Physical Disabilities, Down Syndrome, and Cerebral Palsy

TLC is planning to resume onsite residential summer camp operations in Summer 2021. Texas Lions Camp invites The Harvey E. Najim Charitable Foundation to partner with us again in offering children with special medical conditions from Bexar County the opportunity to attend our campus and participate in our program offerings in Summer 2021.

## **Evaluation Plan:**

Texas Lions Camp (TLC) began a collaborative five-year research study with Clemson University in Summer 2017. Through the leadership of two PhD level researchers, TLC has measured/quantified the impact of programs/activities and obtained resulting feedback. Campers and camper families continue to be engaged by TLC leadership and counselors to complete a survey instrument each summer session. In Summer 2019/Year 3, parents reported growth in children in all targeted outcome areas and these impacts were supported by both the quantitative and qualitative findings. Changes were noted in exploration, communication, and personal responsibility, which were associated with increases in a child's feelings of competence, confidence, and a greater acceptance of their abilities. TLC did not offer residential camp services in Summer 2020 due to Covid-19 and a decision was made to defer Year 4 of the research study until Summer 2021.

### Plans to sustain project beyond the term of this request:

TLC is continuing to expand marketing and development efforts to create increased brand awareness and identify/cultivate support from new prospects (individuals, corporations, foundations and community and regional organizations). An ongoing grants effort for the organization achieved more than 54 successful grant requests over the past four years. This program will be continued in the new fiscal year with the development team working to generate support from foundations/corporations in the Hill Country and San Antonio areas as well as across Texas. TLC has also continued to expand efforts with our annual Golf Tournament which generated \$145,000 in 2020 and more than \$675,000 in the last three years alone.

Texas Lions Camp continues to manage an active social media networks (Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, and You Tube) which are routinely reviewed and new postings are added to inform more than 15,000 followers.

Board members participate in Spring Work Days (1st Saturday-March/April/May) and participate through Lions Clubs in providing funding/volunteer hours for Camp picnics/activities during Summer camp sessions. Board members participate in public relations activities/make presentations to 900+ Lions Clubs and friends of the Camp across the State of Texas. Annually, more than 15,000 hours of in-person and virtual service are given by Board members, Lions and friends of Texas Lions Camp. In 2020, due to Covid-19, activities were limited and conducted online.
