Program / Project Description:

The Guadalupe Regional Medical Foundation is a 501 (c) (3) non-profit created to help Guadalupe Regional Medical Center, a 149-bed not-for-profit community hospital, jointly owned by the City of Seguin and Guadalupe County, located in central Texas. Visionary volunteer leaders established the Guadalupe Regional Medical Foundation, located in Seguin, Guadalupe County as a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization completing its first full year of operation in 1999 for the purpose of raising funds to improve patient services at formerly, Guadalupe Valley Hospital, currently (GRMC) Guadalupe Regional Medical Center. The hospital was built in 1965 as a 64-four bed community hospital, and it is the only hospital in Texas jointly owned by a city and county. The hospital has grown to become a 149-bed acute care regional medical center that offers comprehensive healthcare to the 150,000 residents of Guadalupe County and seven surrounding counties. All gifts are used to fund enhancements of patient care and services of such as our Prescription Assistance Program for those who cannot afford medications, nursing scholarships, and upgrades to equipment and technology. Unlike most community hospitals which receive a portion of their operating revenues from local taxpayers through a hospital district tax, GRMC is funded primarily through patient revenues and charitable contributions.

The hospital employs 700 full-time and part-time people who live throughout the region served by the facility. More than 100 volunteers also serve the hospital and its patients annually.

Guadalupe Regional Medical Center serves a catchment area of over 150,000 citizens in Guadalupe and the surrounding seven counties. Its birthing center is one of the busiest in the region, with almost 1,000 babies delivered annually. GRMC is proud of its national Healthgrades recognition for outstanding patient safety. This regard for patient safety certainly carries over to our tiniest newborn patients in the Birthing Center.

As such, the hospital has budgeted \$166,000 for four additions to our technology and support in the Birthing Center this year:

1.A fetal monitor is an essential technological tool for measuring the neonatal heart rate during the mother's labor. Fetal heart rate monitoring may help detect changes in the normal heart rate pattern during labor. If certain changes are detected, steps can be taken to help treat the underlying problem. Fetal heart rate monitoring also can help prevent treatments that are not needed. A normal fetal heart rate can provide reassurance that it is safe to continue labor if no other problems are present.

The Birthing Center currently has 7 Fetal Coremetrix fetal monitors - 3 are new and 4 are outdated. It is not uncommon to have 7 laboring mothers at any one time. The outdated monitors are increasingly having technologically unsupported service problems, and as a result are leading to loss of confidence by the providers in the accuracy of tracings. We would like to acquire 4 new CoreMetrix monitors at a cost of \$15K each, or \$45K total.

2. Even with the best Fetal Monitor technology, tracings are difficult to obtain when the mother is morbidly obese or if the baby is in a difficult position. If a mother is being monitored early in labor, she typically wants to move around and not be anchored to her bed with the traditional fetal monitoring equipment. A new technology is available to resolve all of those issues: the GE Novii Wireless Patch System. This technology provided improved continuity of fetal heart monitor through a patch applied to the mother's abdomen and a wireless, mobile system. A system to provide coverage to all seven labor rooms is priced at \$49,000.

3. Also in the realm of neonatal safety, the Birthing Center is in need of a new software application that will allow physicians to remotely monitor their patients' tracings while in the office or when not immediately at bedside via their computer or cell phone. The software, called Centricity Perinatal, costs \$26K. It is imperative for real time communication between the attending nurses and the obstetrician for maximal neonatal safety, timely responsiveness and quality of care.

4. In addition to the various neonatal safety requests, the GRMC Birthing Center has budgeted to replace all 12 newborn bassinets which are over 20 years old. Ideally the current bassinettes would be replaced with a new innovation: the Halo Bassinet swivel sleeper. Unfortunately, the Center has experienced two newborn falls in the past year due to mothers placing their newborns in their beds at night, and the infant falling from the bed after the exhausted mother has fallen asleep. Thankfully there has not been an injury, but the goal is to prevent these possible concerns with a new style of bassinet that allows baby to sleep in their protected bassinet but swiveled into the mother's bed for constant contact but also continuous safe protection. Each bassinet costs \$3,830, a full dozen would therefore cost \$45,960.

GRMC is already very thankful to the Najim Family Foundation for its support in purchasing a new obstetrical ultrasound for our Maternal Fetal Medicine program last year. This year, we ask for your consideration to purchase one subset of our planned upgrades for the Birthing Center by providing a grant of \$45,000 to purchase a 4 new CoreMetrix fetal monitors that will deliver a consistent level of care for all of our mothers at GRMC.

Evaluation Plan:

The effectiveness of the proposed new obstetric specific ultrasound would be evaluated through the number of exams provided in the Birthing Center with this machine. This number could be compared to total number of ultrasounds previously performed in the unit with the general ultrasound machine. We would also be able to track number of emergency cases, and diagnoses made through this technology. Simultaneously, we will be able to track number of patients in the MFM clinic who will be able to be examined exclusively with the obstetric specific ultrasound unit.

Plans to sustain project beyond the term of this request:

As with all patient care equipment at the hospital, a preventative maintenance contract would be purchased by the hospital to ensure appropriate repair and back up in case of machine malfunction. The hospital employs a full time Bio Med Department who would also be available to maximize the sustainability of the machine. By not having to share equipment between departments, there will be less wear and tear on the machine as it will not have to be transported across campus on a regular basis.
