Child Abuse & Child Neglect

Program / Project Description:

Support from the Najim Charitable Foundation will address the critical need for Volunteer Advocates who amplify the voices of foster children in Bexar County. Our community suffers from the epidemic of child abuse. Bexar County continuously records the highest number of removals of children who are then placed in foster care in Texas. While CPS case workers try their best to serve these children with equity, the overwhelming numbers often stretch an already thin system leaving huge gaps in health and mental wellness services for the children in their care. On average, these children spend 13 months in foster care, although during the pandemic, cases have been extended and their time in the foster care system has increased. Stability for these children can at times be a luxury. On average a child in foster care changes placement twice; however, if a child has complex medical issues or a disability, they can change placement upwards to six times. This process alone is traumatic and can cause adverse effects on the child. In addition, vital information such as school records, medical records, and court documents are often lost, creating more barriers to overcome. These children are the most critically in need of support in our community. They have faced unfathomable circumstances with the majority of the children having been removed due to abuse and/or neglect. Children who faced abuse and/or neglect are at higher risks of juvenile delinquency, suicide, poor school performance, higher health risks, drug use, and homelessness. For those children that eventually age out of foster care they are met with unstable employment and on average receive lower incomes. These children need constancy. These children need support. They need a trained, objective, and caring adult who can amplify their voices and stay 100% focused on their well-being while they are in the foster care system. They need a CASA advocate.

CASA recruits and trains volunteer advocates from our community who then advocate on behalf of children currently in the legal custody of CPS due to abuse and neglect. While the average age of a child in foster care is 6 years old, the children CASA serves range from babies who are a few weeks old to aged-out foster youth in college. Our volunteers are not your typical volunteers. They are recruited from all walks of life in our community and have to complete a comprehensive interview process and background check. They complete 33 hours of training and are sworn in by a Bexar County Children's Court Judge, giving them the legal right to advocate on behalf of the children on court-appointed welfare cases. Once sworn in, Advocate Supervisors determine the best cases to match with the volunteer. This includes shared backgrounds, volunteer specialization, time commitments, and more. This commitment from the volunteer advocates is not one that is taken lightly. On average, they spend 180 hours per case each year obtaining critical information from contact with doctors, teachers, and other professionals who are aware of the children's unique needs. What isn't measured are the small things the volunteers do to brighten their CASA kids' lives. From buying a child their first birthday gift to helping with homework over zoom calls, or even building a custom bed with their own hands so their CASA kid has their first unshared bed, our volunteers are beyond special. Typically, judges select the most complex cases for CASA to serve on, since our volunteers often only have a caseload of 2 to 3 children. The information volunteer Advocates provide is critical as the judge makes decisions throughout the case and determines the best final placement for the children.

In FY2020, CASA's 751 volunteer advocates served 1,882 children. Of those, 210 children's lives were directly impacted due to the Najim Charitable Foundation. CASA's cost-effective model allows for 27 volunteer advocates to be supervised by 1 paid CASA Advocate Supervisor. On average, CASA's volunteers provide about \$1 million dollars in donated services to the Bexar County Courts.

Continued operational support would help us reach our fiscal year goal to recruit, train and support a capable volunteer base of up to 792 Volunteer Advocates who will serve 1,980 children. We estimate this year's project cost for three Advocate Supervisors to be \$100,000 based on current fringe and salaries. These Advocate Supervisors will manage upwards of 81 volunteers who will serve over 200 children, giving them someone specifically focused on amplifying their needs and well-being above all else.

Evaluation Plan:

Children Immedede

CASA plans to serve 1980 children through the work of 792 volunteer Advocates during our FY20 (July 1, 2020 - June 30, 2021).

CASA will use statistical data collection through the Optima system to track and monitor the following: 1.90% of the time, a CASA Advocate will serve a child as a constant, stable presence through the duration of a case.

2. 100% of the time, Advocates will have a specific and measurable impact on legal, medical and educational outcomes.

3. 95% of the time, Judges will agree and implement suggestions for the child's welfare and placement as recommended by a CASA Advocate.

Plans to sustain project beyond the term of this request:

Since 1984 our community has believed in the mission of CASA as we work to improve the lives of foster children in Bexar County. Our prolonged success in serving these children has led to the continued investment from local, state, and national funders. Their continued support helps the organization not only sustain our services but gradually increase both the number of volunteers recruited and children served. However, CASA is determined to provide an advocate for every child in the foster system in Bexar County. We moved closer to our goal by moving into our new home which will allow us to expand our staff, better train our volunteers, and provide a safe space for our children. Thanks to the recent capital pledge from Mr. Harvey Najim, CASA is now able to not only sustain our current level of service, but expand to serve 2,355 children through 942 volunteers by 2023.
