# **PROJECT INFORMATION**

#### **Program / Project Title:**

To support tuition assistance for the academic year (\$90,000) and the summer tuition assistance program (\$30,000) for low-income children with learning disabilities for the 2018-2019 school year.

## Harvey E. Najim Family Foundation Priorities:

#### Education

#### **Program / Project Description:**

The goal of the Winston School San Antonio's Tuition Assistance Program (TAP) is to provide financial assistance to meet the needs of qualifying low-income students with learning differences. Although Winston is the only fully-accredited school in South Texas serving students with learning disabilities, there are many children who need our help, but are not receiving it.

Winston is a model for teaching students with learning disabilities. Low student-to-teacher ratios, unique classroom strategies, adaptation of curricula to individual students, and multi-model classroom activities help each child find success. We provide arts, athletics, and state-of-the-art technological education. We foster strong communities ties by encouraging our students to take an active role in service and volunteer organizations. We communicate closely with families to ensure their participation in the progress and, ultimately, the success of their child. We find each child's potential for success and build upon it. By working toward competency, achievement, and building self-esteem, students thrive at Winston. On average, over 92% of Winston graduates continue on to a post-secondary institution, with many earning scholarship offers.

For those families who are unable to send their children to Winston during the academic year, our summer programs offer a unique opportunity for students to immerse themselves in an educational program that suits their academic needs. During this intense, four-week program, students will receive specialized instruction while developing long-term advocacy skills.

Families joining Winston often remark that after years of struggle in a traditional academic environment, they have finally found a place that works for their children. As one parent put it, "Winston took a bright child with a broken spirit, and transformed her into a student with a bright future, who breaks down barriers." Such an academic treasure should not be limited to those who can afford it. Through the assistance of partnerships with organizations like the Najim Family Foundation, we are able to provide tuition assistance for children with learning differences whose families are experiencing economic struggles, to give them their best chance at a bright future.

A gift from the Najim Family Foundation will allow for a higher number of students from low-income families to attend Winston during the academic year. Additionally, the funding of this request will allow for 30 students to attend Winston's acclaimed summer academic program.

With your partnership, we can offer tuition assistance to underserved families, so that their children may find a healthy future through educational achievement, community engagement opportunities, and by acquiring the tools they need to make a successful transition after graduation. Your gift will support tuition assistance for qualifying students during Winston's 2018-2019 school year and the 2019 summer program.

#### **Evaluation Plan:**

Students enrolled in the full academic year who are recipients of the funds participate in a pre-test/post-test format using the norm-referenced measure known as the Wide Range Achievement Test (WRAT). The administration then evaluates the results to determine the progress of each individual student. For summer school students, each child will be formally evaluated by their summer instructors. Results will be shared with your foundation.

Additionally, at the completion of the program we will solicit feedback from families through a formal survey process, On a deeper and less quantitative level, we observe success through the re-engagement of students; they become eager for school, regain self-esteem, rise to or above grade level, and, ultimately, they depart to become productive members of society.

#### Plans to sustain project beyond the term of this request:

Winston's faculty, staff, administration, and board members strongly support the Tuition Assistance Program, and work cohesively on all aspects to sustain and grow the program. Throughout the year, we continue to solicit financial partners, like the Harvey E. Najim Foundation, and other community partners, including the Trinity University Education Department, UT Health, and others.
