Program / Project Description:

Thanks to the support of generous partners such as the Harvey E. Najim Charitable Foundation, SSA eliminated the historic low vision backlog in the homes of all 115 San Antonio area children with severe visual impairment in 2016. We continue to provide EVMs for newly identified children each year (children who age into the program, develop new/worsening vision conditions or move into the area). Over the last year, SSA received a larger number of referrals for the maintenance phase. 26 children are currently on our waiting list. These additional children were previously unreachable due to unresponsive parents or lack of knowledge of their existence. SSA worked extensively with local partners, such as SA Lighthouse for the Blind, to locate these children. SSA requests funding from the Najim Family Foundation to provide life-changing EVMs to 20 children at the SSA/San Antonio Lighthouse clinic in Fall 2020.

EVMs digitally enhance contrast and magnify objects up to 118x, empowering children with low vision to see the world more clearly and perform daily activities independently, often for the first time. This includes reading, writing, completing homework assignments, grooming, and other daily tasks that enhance academic performance. This cost effective solution includes ongoing follow-up support from SSA staff over the life of the equipment and is an investment in a child's life. The high price of this technology (not covered by health insurance) prohibits most families from purchasing one.

Due to the success of the children's program and the desire of local foundations, SSA began providing EVMs for San Antonio area adults with severe visual impairment. In our overall project, over 50 children and adults will receive EVMs this coming year (dependent on full funding). Funds awarded by the Najim Foundation will be allocated exclusively to serve children within the Foundation's specified footprint and would support the majority of children. Funds awarded to this program from other sources will serve mainly adults. The attached budget reflects expenses for all activities within SSA's San Antonio service area for the coming program year.

Using a state-of-the-art Plusoptix vision screening device, SSA's Vision Screening Program screens thousands of children annually in THC counties. Trained SSA staff administer vision screenings, detecting conditions such as anisocoria, anisometropia, astigmatism, corneal reflex abnormalities, myopia (nearsightedness), and hyperopia (farsightedness). Children found to have a potential vision issue are referred to SSA's Eye Care Program for case managed follow-up eye care. SSA screens and receives referrals from day cares, head starts, preschools and elementary schools in Kerr, Bandera, Kendall counties.

We also propose continuing the successful pilot project in Bexar & Comal counties for San Antonio daycares, head starts, and community preschools. The second year of this screening program would provide screenings for up to 1140 children in Bexar and Comal counties (with full funding from all sources). We anticipate providing eye care for up to 1,000 children referred in the coming school year in THC and up to 114 in San Antonio.

National data show that only 30% of children failing a vision screening actually receive treatment. Failure to receive treatment causes delays in and out of the classroom, and can result in permanent vision loss for children with amblyopia. Amblyopia occurs in 2% of all children, but can be successfully treated in almost all cases with minimal cost during preschool years. However, if left untreated until later in elementary school, the overwhelming majority of cases fail even the most expensive treatments (surgery). After failed vision screenings, SSA case manages each child's eye care treatment from start to finish, successfully obtaining treatments for over 75% of referred children, an increase of 150% over national data.

Upon referral, SSA connects children with local eye care providers within our network for eye examinations and treatments. Services provided through case management include: parent education about eye care needs, eye exams, eyeglasses, treatment for amblyopia, all other recommended treatments/continuing care, results reporting to schools and support for school nurses. And children establish an eye care home for recurrent care throughout childhood.

SSA proactively removes barriers for needy children by ensuring they have access to vision treatments (provided at no cost to qualifying families). When children's vision needs are addressed, reading scores increase, classroom performance improves, graduation rates increase, and children can become more productive citizens and future members of the workforce. These programs are more critical than ever before as our country faces COVID-19. With nationwide school closings, the special needs and low-income children we serve face additional barriers. Students with low vision are likely to fall and stay further behind than their normally sighted schoolmates as they transition to remote learning. While some schools are able to provide vision technology for classroom use only, the children our program serves are not able to afford this vital equipment in their homes. They often rely on their parents to help read even normal size print or they utilize special large print handouts from teachers. These children need autonomy and an ability to see and complete their schoolwork now more than ever.

For these reasons, your support is life-changing. Funds requested from the Harvey E. Najim Family Foundation are detailed in the attached budget. The present Najim request would support follow-up eye care services for 286 children referred in the THC, EVMs for 20 children with severe visual impairment in San Antonio, and vision screenings for 771 children in San Antonio (estimated 77 referrals for follow-up eye care).

Evaluation Plan:

The success of the Low Vision Program is evaluated by the number of persons served & the impact of the program. SSA follows up with each child served through age 19 to evaluate progress & gather feedback/measure the impact of technology. Our follow up survey captures data in a statistical, scientific manner using the Likert Scale, allowing us to evaluate the significance of the equipment immediately and over time.

Our goals for the coming school year include providing vision screenings for up to 3,300 children in THC and up to 1140 in SA (Vision Screening Program) & ensuring over 75% of children referred achieve their best possible vision (Eye Care Program). SSA keeps detailed records on eye exams, glasses, surgeries, & other prescribed treatments. SSA calculates the percentage of children attaining their best possible vision out of the total number of children referred during the year (outcome-based measurement).

Plans to sustain project beyond the term of this request:

SSA has been working in the San Antonio area since 2013. Plans for sustaining these programs in the future involve utilizing in-kind funding as well as actively pursuing local and national grant support and corporate support. SSA's partnering eye care professionals provide donated or significantly discounted services for these programs, maximizing every dollar provided by our valued funders. SSA's partnership with Vispero provides equipment discounts and travel reimbursements to offset the costs of delivering EVMs. We are pleased with our recent successes in securing funding in the San Antonio area - thanks to the support and involvement of many local partners - and are confident in our ability to sustain programming in future years.

Vision Screening: Up to 3,300 pre-school and school-age children will be vision screened in THC. Up to 1140 pre-school children will be screened in SA. The same safety protocols for low vision clinics will be adjusted and implemented for school vision screenings (such as wearing masks, gloves, protective gear, testing temperatures, allowing for 15+ feet between vision screening stations, and more). SSA's Plusoptix vision screening device is a mobile device, and allows for six feet distance between the vision screener and the child. SSA will limit the number of vision screeners present at each event to two people.
