# **Program / Project Description:**

Our goal is to help at risk students improve their math and reading skills in an effort to enable them to excel throughout middle school and high school. These students often times come from homes where their parents or guardians did not finish high school or had the opportunity to attend college due to a plethora of converging socio-economic factors (e.g. household instability, food insecurity, poverty, domestic violence). Through our After School Program we seek to provide personalized student-focused tutoring in an enriched and challenging academic setting to allow our students to amplify their knowledge and skills and gain the confidence to thrive and reach new unfamiliar horizons; empowering them to become the first members of their families to not only graduate from high school but to pursue a higher education or vocational training.

At the After School Program, we understand that in order for our students to excel in school and dream about pursuing a college education, the student's parents or guardians need to be involved in the process. As such, we offer monthly family nights, where we talk to parents about the importance of supporting their children's education, creating a supportive academic environment at home by being more involved and understanding some of the challenges their children might face. The goal of these events is to engage the parents in their child's education in order to break the educational poverty cycle and ensure that our students are successful by enabling parents to become active participants in their child's academic journey.

Given the educational records we obtained from the schools where our students attend, we have observed a need for more specialized assistance in math. Our students demonstrated a lack of understanding that if left unaddressed will decrease their chances of passing the STAAR test and math courses. For some student this results in having to repeat a grade or even worse crushing their spirit and changing their attitudes towards school, impacting their whole trajectory by pushing those left behind to feel inadequate - ultimately leading to an increase in school drop-outs.

Aside from providing general program support, funding will allow us to hire a part-time after school math instructor that will focus on improving math comprehension levels for all the students participating in the program. He/she will develop personalized plans to address the needs of students demonstrating the lowest retention scores in order to ensure they get the attention necessary to help them succeed. Pre and post evaluations will be administered to effectively measure the students knowledge acquisition, class grades and test scores will also be collected to determine the overall success of the program. By continuing to implement our personalized student-focused tutoring program and adding a math instructor our goal is to holistically improve the academic success of our students. Improving their math skills will ultimately create successful students with a positive attitude towards one of the subjects that typically holds students back and makes them feel inept.

# **Evaluation Plan:**

The short term impact of the program will be improved course grades and test scores, specifically each students math scores. The long-term impact is the confidence and attitude changes students develop as they begin to understand the material and gain the knowledge and skills to thrive inside the classroom environment. Ultimately resulting in students confidently transitioning from middle school to high school and to hopefully pursue a college education. Pre and post subject evaluations will be administered, grades and test scores will be collected, attendance and academic performance will also be tracked for each student.

## Plans to sustain project beyond the term of this request:

In an effort to ensure the Guadalupe Community Center and the programs we offer are funded for a long term we have developed a diversified portfolio of revenue sources, we receive funds from corporations, private foundations, government grants, investments and fundraising efforts.
