Program / Project Description:

Kids Club partners with local schools, volunteers and families to affirm God-given value and multiply possibilities together. Kids Club creates a fun, engaging environment where more than 300 kids thrive through positive relationships with caring adults. Kids grow academically, expand life skills, and develop Godly character.

In the 2020/2021 school year, 296 elementary students (grades 1-5) will attend the after-school program twice per week and spend six hours interacting with a consistent team of volunteers. Kids Club will serve students that are enrolled in thirteen elementary schools who are recommended to the program by school representatives. Kids Club will provide programming at its main campus and on campus at four additional elementary schools. Referred students are in greatest need for intervention. Most students are performing below grade level when they enroll at Kids Club, and most qualify for free or reduced lunch.

Without Kids Club, most of these students would not have an adult to assist with school assignments at home, few students would have an adult mentor, and almost all would have more unsupervised time at home. Providing a consistent adult mentor who is an active participant in each student's education allows students falling behind to succeed and giving them confidence in their schoolwork. Kids Club tailors programming to build upon the work of teachers and parents to help each child develop and grow. Activities each program day include a healthy meal, chapel time, outdoor play, reading/math support, and homework help.

The provision of healthy snacks and meals is an integral component of Kids Club. These meals are very important because providing a balanced meal is not a priority, or perhaps possibility, in many student homes.

Kids Club Main Campus Program Coordinator Corrie Cash shares how nutrition is a key component to a student's academic and social success. "Meals and snacks are a vital part of our program at Kids Club. Providing food for our children allows them to see Kids Club as a safe place, and in turn, allows us to earn their trust and build relationships faster. Offering snacks and meals gives every child the opportunity to learn manners and mealtime etiquette. At Kids Club, children practice waiting their turn in line for a dinner plate, using polite words such as "please" and "thank you," and learning how to sit and converse at the table with others. The healthy food we have available for the children ultimately provides an opening for us to teach them important life skills, which will leave a lasting impact."

Kids Club will dramatically expand its summer program in 2021. Kids Club will offer 100 local students each week with an opportunity to participate in programming five days per week during eight weeks of summer. The summer schedule will be intentional, interactive, engaging, and full of fun learning activities. Students will enjoy themed activities, math games, open gym play, reading practice, outdoor play, biblical teaching, team building activities, inflatable games, and much more. NBCM initially planned to launch this new program in 2020, but the launch was delayed to 2021 due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Students will have the opportunity to register for one week or multiple weeks (up to 8). Registration fees will be required of all children, but pricing will be tiered to offer reduced fees for select families. Program leadership anticipates that each week, 70 campers will be participants in Kids Club's school year program or students referred by schools. The remaining thirty camper spots each week are expected to be filled by other students residing in the community. Kids Club anticipates that 650 unduplicated students will participate in the new summer program.

Research shows that two months of academic skills are lost over a single summer. The summer slide makes it even harder for students who are struggling academically during the school year to catch up to their peers. Kids Club will deliver solid educational material using fun, engaging teaching techniques. In 2019, Kids Club offered a half-day summer program to 50 Kids Club students each week for four weeks. In 2020, Kids Club will host small family events that allow social distancing. The expanded summer program schedule for 2021 will offer 100 local children a full-day schedule (7:30am-5:30pm; Monday through Friday). New Braunfels ISD is a key partner in the new summer program; the district plans to host the day camp on a school campus, sponsor camp meals, and consult in creation of summer academic programming.

Kids Club has grown substantially from its inaugural program year (2006) when it served 37 students to 311 children in the 2019/2020 school year. Kids Club launched a pilot program at its first school-based site at Morningside Elementary School in 2015. Grant funds from Najim Charitable Foundation helped Kids Club to expand to Goodwin-Frazier Elementary in 2016, Startzville Elementary in 2017, and Freiheit Elementary in 2019.

During the 2020/2021 grant cycle, Kids Club will provide 650 unduplicated children with an opportunity to grow academically, spiritually, and socially. New Braunfels Christian Ministries invites Najim Charitable Foundation to continue support of Kids Club's Nutrition Initiative and School-based Program Sites and provide new funding to help launch Kids Club Summer in 2021. A \$100,000 grant will help students to develop skills that will equip them to succeed in life, build confidence in their academic abilities, learn skills to navigate challenging social situations and set goals for the future.

Evaluation Plan:

Students participating in Kids Club will expand hope for positive change, increase confidence in their academic abilities, and gain skills in conflict resolution and self-control that will equip them to interact respectfully with their peers and adults.

NBCM will pursue the following goals for Kids Club in the 2020/2021 school year: 100% of students will receive a snack and meal each day they attend Kids Club, 90% of students will demonstrate positive changes in behavior or maintain good behavior (respect/responsibility) as measured by program volunteers, and 90% of students will improve/maintain good habits of completing homework (aim high/ready to work) at the start and end of the school year.

2021 Summer Program goal: 100% of students will receive 2 snacks and 2 meals each day they attend Kids Club.

Plans to sustain project beyond the term of this request:

The organization relies heavily on foundation grants, private donations, and other charitable gifts to sustain operations. Income from student registration for Kids Club's summer program will cover only a small portion of program expenses. Kids Club is working to strengthen community partnerships and increase program funding to support continued program expansion and improvement.
