Harvey E. Najim Family Foundation Priorities:

Program / Project Description:

Over the years, San Antonio has seen a growing population of children with developmental delays such as autism, Down syndrome, cerebral palsy, etc. The Autism Lifeline Links 2019 Legislative Agenda identifies that more than 30,000 individuals are living with autism in the San Antonio Core Based Statistical Area. This number does not include individuals with other developmental delays such as Down syndrome, cerebral palsy, etc. Furthermore, a recent news report published in Open Minds on February 17, 2019, reported that less than 10% of adults with developmental delays in Bexar county have access to services due to funding constraints. Research shows that providing services, such as ours, early in a child's development plays a significant role in their success as adults. The Najim Family Foundation has contributed significantly to ensuring that children with special needs have access to services that will help them grow into adults that are contributing members of our community. In their daily lives, children with autism, Down syndrome, and other special needs have few opportunities to just have fun and be a 'normal kid'. For these children, adequate support is lacking outside the school. This is a problem because much of a child's development occurs in the home and community. In addition, a caregiver's well-being is inextricably linked to that of their child, and this role as caretaker can take a heavy toll. These parents need respite as much as their children need fun and enriching activities.

In response to this problem, Special Reach programs are carefully designed to help children with special needs and their siblings develop their social skills and create lasting memories in an inclusive setting, while simultaneously providing their caregivers with a well-deserved respite. In order to ensure peace of mind for the parents of these special children, all our programs are equipped with highly qualified staff which include speech pathologists, school counselors, special education teachers, and others with specialized skillsets. Our ultimate goal is helping kids and their families improve their quality of life by having fun! Far too often fun is marginalized when serving children with special abilities, in deference to more quantifiable outcomes. At our programs these precious children participate in games, crafts, sports, friendly interaction with others, and a time to drop everything and just dance! While such a gathering may seem like no big deal to the parents of well a socialized child, to these kids and their parents, the events are a big deal.

We are requesting support for our year-round programs, both school year programs and summer programs. Our school year programs include 'Party Nights' and school holiday programs. Party Nights are held from 6:30 - 9:30 PM on Friday nights at any of these locations: Arc of San Antonio- Pam Stevens Ctr. 6530 Wurzbach Rd. San Antonio, TX 78240, Crown of Life Lutheran Church 19291 Stone Oak Pkwy San Antonio, TX 78258, Morgan's Wonderland 5223 David Edwards Dr. San Antonio, TX 78233. Our holiday programs are held during extended school breaks such as Thanksgiving break, spring break, etc. Our summer day program will offer 4 sessions in 2019 at Crown of Life Lutheran Church 19291 Stone Oak Pkwy San Antonio and Living Church at Woodlawn Pointe 702 Donaldson Ave. San Antonio, TX 78201. These programs will be led by a program director who will supervise at least 12 experienced special education staff members and a team of adult and teen volunteers. The program will be overseen by the CEO. Each site is set up with 3 distinct areas: The Gym - interactive games, fitness and guest activities; The Craft Area - themed arts and crafts such as birdfeeders and maracas; Media Room - video games such as X-Box, Wii, etc.; with additional outdoor activities (e.g. water games) in the summer. All programs are designed with the intention to provide a diverse and safe set of activities for the children.

Special Reach's impact stretches beyond the children who attend its programs. We are contributing to developing healthy families and socially adept children in our community. Over 87% of our latest 2018 parent survey respondents report that our program improved their child's social skills, and 100% of them reported that our program provided them with respite. Also, approximately 95% of parents surveyed wanted to see our programs expanded. We are meeting this need in 2019 by adding more summer session and introducing our holiday programs. We are committed to providing consistent staff while maintaining the high quality of service for which we have become known. This grant will be used to offset the costs of the equipment, program guests, program facility rentals, payment of program staff, scholarships, and other supplies such as crafts, printing, etc.

Evaluation Plan:

Anecdotally and through surveys and stakeholder feedback, we know that we are improving lives. The outcome that we most want to impact through this initiative is quality of life -- for children with disabilities as well as for their parents/caregivers. With the expanded program, and to the extent possible, we will quantify our impact through pre- and post-program surveys, anecdotal data, and by analyzing attendance data. Our survey instrument will measure improvements in social skills of the children, as well as their outlook, as perceived by parents, our staff and by the children themselves. In addition, we will examine attendance data over the year to determine how consistently each family has attended. This is perhaps the most important indicator of our success -- do the children want to be there? Our 2018 attendance record shows 838 children attended our programs. This means that each child attended about 6.5 times.

Plans to sustain project beyond the term of this request:

Special Reach holds 3-4 fundraisers per year and charges a fee to help cover the expenses associated with our programs. As we have grown, we have been exposed to many more individual and corporate donors, as well as other grant makers. We are working diligently to further diversify our funding base through annual appeals, exploring other avenues to fulfill our mission, and applying to additional grant makers so that we can continue to meet this growing need in our community.
