Program / Project Description:

About one-quarter of San Antonio's children live in poverty. For their parents or caregivers, providing basic needs for them can be a hardship. Togs For Tots seeks to help these economically disadvantaged families by providing their newborn through preschool children with new clothing, personal care supplies, books, and a bilingual developmental information book. Through referrals from about 40 social service agencies covering the greater San Antonio area, Togs For Tots is budgeted to directly impact 6,000 children this year, including 1,000 San Antonio ISD Pre-K students. An award of \$65,000 from the Najim Family Foundation would be used to purchase clothing for 1,755 children.

Infants in the program receive a layette containing a gown handmade by Assistance League members, onesies, sleepers, receiving blankets, socks, a cap, body wash, and baby lotion. Older children (through age four) receive two complete outfits of clothing (shirts and pants, a coat, underwear, socks) plus body wash, toothpaste, a toothbrush, a comb, and a hairbrush. SAISD students receive one school uniform and one outfit. All children receive age-appropriate books. Every item provided is high-quality and brand new.

Parents served by Togs For Tots often lack the financial resources, family support, and sometimes the child-rearing knowledge needed to adequately provide and care for their children. The program provides parents with "Watch Me Grow from Head to Toe," a booklet designed to educate them about a baby's expected growth and developmental progress. Produced by Assistance League, the booklet is written in English and Spanish.

Members of Assistance League - all of whom are volunteers - handle all aspects of the program, including maintaining an inventory of clothing and supplies, interacting with referring agencies to fill their orders and solicit evaluation input, and administering the program's budget to assure efficient use of funds.

Covid-19 has disrupted our procedures somewhat. Many of the agencies from whom we receive referrals were closed for a period of time, but the ones that did stay open have reported an increased need among their clients for services like Togs For Tots. The Assistance League building was closed for a while, which meant our philanthropic programs were temporarily suspended. With the needs of our community's young and vulnerable members in mind, Assistance League members have worked creatively and cautiously to continue to serve them.

Evaluation Plan:

Quantitative measurement will look at number of children served, their residential zip codes, number of agencies participating, and budget compliance. Qualitative measurement is more difficult because Assistance League does not have direct contact with the children served by the program or their parents. For this measurement, Assistance League solicits input from participating agencies about the value of the program to their clients, the efficiency with which the program's service is delivered, and interest in future participation. Responses are almost completely positive, with only the wish that more children could be served.

Assistance League also conducts an annual survey of its members to measure their satisfaction with its philanthropic programs. Input provides valuable insight into how well the operation works, the ease with which members can do their "jobs," and their interest in continuing to work on Togs For Tots and other programs.

Plans to sustain project beyond the term of this request:

Assistance League has operated Togs For Tots since 1988. Because of ever-increasing economic need in our community, Assistance League will continue this program as long as there is interest and funding. Financial support will come from community generosity (grants and donations), proceeds from the operation of Assistance League's resale shop, and fundraisers. To ensure that Togs For Tots will be managed efficiently and economically, Assistance League volunteers are committed to serving in all aspects of the program, including the careful and frugal purchasing of Togs For Tots clothing and supplies.
