Harvey E. Najim Charitable Foundation Priorities:

Child Abuse & Child Neglect

Program / Project Description:

Chosen's programs exist to keep vulnerable children in safe, loving homes. Through the use of evidence-based practices, Chosen provides transformative mental and behavioral health services to help children overcome the trauma they have experienced while in the child welfare system.

Chosen fills a gap in the San Antonio child welfare landscape by providing a life-on-life, attachment-focused model of care to help whole families heal. Our programs are unique, and there are many children who still need our help. Unfortunately, families often do not have the financial resources to obtain services; over 50% of the families served by Chosen live under the poverty line. A gift from the Najim Charitable Foundation will be used to provide program scholarships to low-income families in 2021 and 2022.

Children in the welfare system have often suffered domestic abuse, neglect, abandonment, or loss. Without the appropriate tools and resources, parents are often left struggling to nurture their children's social and emotional development, ultimately hindering their ability to provide a stable home. Chosen provides the resources needed to mitigate the short and long-term effects of the trauma their children have experienced.

Our model of care is unique, but proven to be effective. In 2020, the children we served experienced a 90% reduction in depression and a 75% reduction in anxiety, among other clinical . To address the holistic needs of the children we serve, we employ a customized three-pillar approach:

1) One-on-One Parent Coaching and Education using evidence-based, trauma-informed curricula.

2) Personalized Case Management to connect families with the community resources they need.

3) Therapeutic Services that are proven to be most effective for this population, including Dyadic Development Psychotherapy and Trauma-Focused Cognitive Behavioral Therapy.

Chosen relentlessly walks alongside the families that we serve. Trauma-Informed Action Plans (R), the use of Trust-Based Relational Intervention(R) (TBRI), and the development of deep, authentic relationships provide a foundation for healing. We provide actionable weekly plans to help families attach to one another. We offer services and referrals to meet each family's unique needs. We communicate closely with parents and caregivers to ensure their full participation in their children's healing process. We find each child's unique path to healing, and venture down that path with them. By working toward healthy attachment, children and families begin to thrive together, which ultimately prevents family breakdown. Since 2016, no child has been returned to the child welfare system after working with Chosen for 6+ months. This is in stark contrast to the general population, in which an estimated 32% of children are returned to the system.

Families who work with Chosen often remark that they have finally found a program that empowers them and establishes healing in their homes. As one parent put it, "Chosen taught us how to help our child advocate for himself. But they also taught us to advocate for him. Chosen gave us a voice." This hope should not be limited only to those with financial means. Through the assistance of and partnership with generous organizations like the Najim Charitable Foundation, Chosen can provide our programs at no cost to children in low income families, to give them their best chance at a bright future.

Evaluation Plan:

Every family who works with Chosen participates in clinical assessments that allow staff to evaluate the success of our programs.

The following assessment tools are used to quantify the success of Chosen's programs: Parent Stress Index (PSI)/Stress Index for Parents of Adolescents (SIPA); Trauma Symptom Checklist for Young Children (TSCYC)/Trauma Symptom Checklist for Children (TSCC); Stress Index; Biopsychosocial Assessment; Adverse Childhood Experiences Survey (ACEs); Anxiety and Depression Survey; Self-Assessment and Attachment Interviews.

Outputs and outcomes are tracked during service delivery, as well as 6 and 12 months after services have concluded. Prior to service, assessments are administered that measure parental stress levels and trauma-related behaviors of children. After those initial assessment results are received, levels are entered into Chosen's Client Management System so they can be compared to assessments completed post-service. This data is reviewed on a weekly basis by Chosen's program staff to monitor client progress.

Plans to sustain project beyond the term of this request:

Chosen's Board of Directors and staff are strong advocates for Chosen, and work cohesively to ensure the sustainability of the programs. Throughout the year, we continue to solicit financial partners, like the Harvey E. Najim Charitable Foundation along with corporate and individual investors. Additionally, in 2020 Chosen implemented a modest fee-based structure for clients with the financial means to pay for services.

This, coupled with funding from VOCA out of The Office of the Governor, a contract with the Bexar County Court System, and our upcoming Medicaid credentialing will enable Chosen to continue offering scholarships to low income children throughout San Antonio.
